## SERMON – *Come and Have Breakfast*

### SCRIPTURE

Old Testament—Psalm 31:1-5, 15-16

New Testament — John 21:1-14

Text: verse 12: Jesus said to the, “Come and have breakfast.” Now none of the disciples dared ask him, “Who are you”? because they knew it was the Lord.

Some of you have done some camping. One of the joys of that experience is to smell some of the aromas that waft through the campgrounds in the morning. The smell of coffee, bacon and eggs is quite a pleasure. We have a breakfast scene like that here in our scripture passage this morning. Listen to the crackle of the fire going on near the beach with the waves gently lapping on the shore. Smell the smoke, hear the sizzle of the fish frying and delight in the fragrance of just-baked bread.

Here we find Jesus, the resurrected Lord, fussing with fish and cooking breakfast along the shore of the Sea of Tiberias. Why in the world with this man have time to spend with some discouraged anglers and then also do the work of a cook, poking at a charcoal fire with a stick, frying up some fish and baking pita bread?

Generally speaking, the higher a person ascends in power and prestige, the less likely it is that he or she will either have the time or desire to deal with some of life’s more mundane details. The most powerful CEOs don’t have to deal with taking out the office garbage or repairing the broken drinking fountain. The higher one climbs the ladder of success, the less one has to do with the lower, more ordinary chores of life.

Here we find the risen Christ giving fishing tips and serving as the chief cook and bottle washer. “Catch anything”? Jesus shouts to the disciples, “no” they answered; “then cast your nets to the other side of the boat.” After the disciples catch the most fish they ever caught, Jesus invites them to breakfast. “Come and have breakfast,” he says. (verse 10)

Like those two disciples on Emmaus Road, these disciples do not recognize Jesus either. He is a stranger to them. “Who are you?” they wonder. Jesus sits with them on the beach, sharing food; it is a new day, a new world for the disciples. Their eyes are opened and they see Jesus risen before them. Jesus begins again, with these very same disciples who had forsaken, betrayed and denied him; the same ones who did not recognize him and starts speaking with them. There are many lessons that we can learn from the disciples encounter with the Risen Christ along the beach of the Sea of Tiberias. I will lift up two of those lessons for your thinking. Trust me, there are many more in this passage; you will want to add your own learnings, too.

First, it teaches us that if one is to meet the living Christ, it just might not be on Sunday, but the encounter may be on Monday morning while having breakfast. Jesus is Lord of the whole week and all of life. The risen Christ is free and moving and does not intend to be boxed in for one day or one hour during worship. Jesus does not recognize the separation between secular and religious. He is intrusive and comes to you and speaks to you where you are. Pay attention tomorrow when you are at the breakfast table, washing dishes, taking care of the grandchildren, cleaning yet another closet, or on your daily walk, there just may be a sacred moment and encounter. Easter is true and Easter means among other things, that Jesus is loose and looking for you!

Think of how we celebrated Easter Day, this year. We did not have a large congregation gathering, no choir with festive and celebrative music and no Easter lilies with their fragrance filling the sanctuary. Those were all gone. The sanctuary was empty. While we abandoned our sacred gathering place, we did not abandon the gospel. We testified to what the white robed messenger announced at the tomb, "he is not here." Where then, is he? Our passage says that Jesus is out looking for his disciples, the very ones that abandoned him and ready to start over again. And the risen Christ can surely find you on this fifth Sunday in Easter, wherever you have isolated yourself.

Another lesson that we learn in this passage is that we can't go home again. We cannot reverse the course of events and return to a time that we remember with warm nostalgia. Remember the disciples were called away from their vocation of fisherman and then commissioned to fish for people.

But then Jesus was crucified, dead and buried. The disciples' hopes were shattered, their leader, teacher and Savior was gone. So, these disciples went back to that fork in the road, and tried to pick up their former profession as fisherman again. Peter said, "I am going fishing;" and all the disciples said, we are going with you"! But that night they caught nothing. Which is to say, one can't go back to the good o'le days. The 1950s were the heyday of Protestantism when our churches were full and active places. That time period was marked as "a spirituality of dwelling," where people viewed the church as a safe and comfortable place to be nurtured. A quick look at protestant churches will indicate that many of the new additions were made in the late 1950s or early 1960s. Like those early disciples, we cannot go back to that place again.

The trauma and impact of the present moment is going to have a similar influence. It's going to be impossible for us as a culture and church to go back to the way it was before Covid-19 came as an uninvited guest and disrupted our lives. The temptation is to be like those early disciples and say, "let's go fishing"! Let's go back to what we know. Let's be the same church we were before all this pain, suffering and upheaval took place.

God just might be calling the St. Andrew's congregation to something different. Let me confess that I am not sure what that model of church might be. When the congregation called me to ministry here, I didn't come expecting a situation like this, or with a new bag of tricks to change the church, because this old dog was retired and out of new tricks.

In the pain, suffering, change and uncertainty of these strange days, I do believe that God is calling the church to a new Easter normal. Easter resurrection is about new life, new hope, new ways of being. The joy and challenge before us, is to now become aware and ready to rediscover God's new and fresh purposes for his church today. Easter's hope gives me the confidence that just as God raised Jesus from the dead, God can and will do the same for us today. Amen.

Let us pray.

Almighty and ever-loving God, the beginning and the end, of all that is, and all that shall be, give us a fresh vision of your promised glory and renewed sense of your purpose for creation. Refresh our hope for the completion of your good intent for the world, so that we might live today as those who have seen the shape of the future. In Jesus' name. Amen.
