Today marks the Seventh and final Sunday of the Easter Season. During these seven Sundays, it's been my practice to begin the Call to Worship with the Easter greeting, "Christ is risen, He is risen, indeed;" and the Salutation from Revelation 1:4. Next Sunday is Pentecost Sunday and will make room for some changes in the liturgy.

Ascension Day occurred this past Thursday, so today's worship combines an Ascension Day theme with Easter hope. I also realize that the secular calendar is celebrating Memorial Day, so the Prayer of Thanksgiving and Intercession remembers those men and women who have served our country in the armed forces.

SERMON – Witnesses to the Ends of the Earth!

SCRIPTURE

Old Testament—Psalm 68:1-10, 32-35 New Testament — Acts 1:6-14 Text – Acts 1:8

"But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of of the earth."

Today's scripture on this seventh Sunday of Easter is from the Acts of the Apostles. Easter continues. Jesus was raised from the dead and now he convened his scattered, fearful, disillusioned disciples. Jesus had earlier commanded his disciples, to "love one another," and to "go, make disciples!" Now in Acts, "You will be my witnesses in Jerusalem (that is close to home), Judea (that is the whole countryside) and Samaria (that is way out there, the very ends of the earth). You will be my witnesses, says the Risen Christ."

Who's a witness? A witness is someone who has observed an event. For example, if a person is called to court, they are called to testify, to tell the court what they saw. A witness witnesses something and then tells the court what they saw. There is an Eye Witness News program as well, which uses the same principal which gives witness to the facts of what has been seen and heard. And here, the risen Christ, after Easter, calls us to be witnesses.

Jesus Christ is not some figment of our imagination. He is not a feeling. He is a distinct personality who makes some distinctive, irreducible claims, who makes specific promises, like the promises he makes in Acts today. Jesus is the God who came to us, who came back to us, a God different from our ideas of God, so different from our ideas of God, we couldn't have thought him up ourselves. You don't have to be a perfect person, a great speaker, you just have to be a witness, just testify to what you have seen and heard. This is how Christians are made, one ordinary person telling another what has happened. And Christ calls you to witness. Your testimonial of what you have seen and heard is powerful.

One of the many lessons that the Sheltering in Place order has taught us about our Christian faith, is that the church is the people, the body of Christ, whether we are in the building or not. While the building has been closed these last 10 weeks, the body of Christ is open!

While corporate worship concludes on Sunday with the Benediction, faith does not end there when we walk out of the sanctuary but begins as the body of Christ breaks and goes into the world to reveal and witness to Jesus Christ whether we are in our homes, work, school, or wherever we are.

We are called to be witnesses to the risen Christ. Evangelism has been defined as being dedicated to the task of helping people believe in Jesus Christ. As we witness, we help other believe in Jesus Christ. People are looking at us; listening to us, at our witness. One has to ask, "what does our witness say about us, about our faith?" It is essential that as the burden of proof rests on us, we give a solid witness that our lives and message are believable. There must be consistency between the way we believe and the way we behave. One of the problems in our attempt to be witnesses and share the love of Christ, is that people do not find us believable because our lives stand in contradiction to what we say we believe. To be a witness to Jesus Christ is to link what we say with our lips to how we live our lives.

Let me conclude with what an unknown author put strongly in, The Gospel According to You.

"There's a sweet old story translated for people today, but written in the long, long, ago –

The Gospel according to Mark, Luke and John, of Christ and His mission below.

You are writing a gospel, a chapter each day, by deeds that you do, by words that you say, people read what you write, whether faithless or true.

Say, what is the gospel according to you?

People read and admire the Gospel of Christ, with its love so unfailing and true; but what do they say, and what do they think of the gospel according to you?

Tis a wonderful story, that gospel of love, as it shines in the Christ-life divine, and O, that its truth might be told again in the story of your life and mine!

Unselfish mirrors in every scene, love blossoms on every sod, and back from its vision the heart comes to tell the wonderful goodness of God.

You are writing each day a letter to people, take care that the writing is true. Tis the only gospel some people will read, that gospel according to you."
