

POSTLUDE

SERMON – The Parable of Weeds Among the Wheat

Scripture - Matthew 13:24-30, 36-43

If you have a garden or lawn to maintain, then you have been challenged with the problem of weeds. No matter how hard one tries to keep their garden or lawn free of weeds, somehow they manage to find their way in, start growing and overtake the good green grass or vegetables. What does one do about weeds?

That question is posed in the scripture lesson today. In Jesus' time, people lived close to the land and depended on the growing season in a more intimate way than we do today; although farmers will understand this fragile relationship better than most of us.

Jesus knew something about farming and how a person could not distinguish a kennel of wheat from a weed and the danger of how the crop might be damaged if one tried to separate the two before the time of harvest. If the weeds were pulled up prematurely, the good crop may be pulled up as well. Jesus understood this danger as did those listening to him preach this lesson.

Jesus wasn't advising his listeners about being good farmers or having weed free lawns. In this parable, Jesus is preaching once again about God, God's kingdom and reign and those who were worried about being choked out by evil.

In an old Peanuts cartoon, Charlie Brown is confronted by Lucy who says to him, "Charlie Brown, you are crabgrass on the lawn of life!" For Lucy, in her anger, Charlie Brown is a hinderance, a sore spot, that keeps life from being what she thinks it ought to be.

Dandelions and weeds are those people or problems that keep life from being the way it should be, people and problems that interfere with God's will for creation. We are keenly aware of some of those weeds in the field in which God has placed us. Those that tear down life, rather than build up life, those that lie and cheat to get a head, those that exploit others for their own personal gain, those that hurt and harm others rather than help and affirm. We see those weeds all around us!

The parable goes deeper though and shows us the field as God sees it, not as we see it from our limited perceptions. The kingdom of God goes beyond dandelions mixed with green grass on the lawn of life. Jesus reveals that more powerful and cosmic forces are present and likens it to the conflict between good and evil. You see, Jesus is the good sower and bears the good seed. In his life, ministry, death, resurrection and ascension; the Gospel has been proclaimed. God's saving grace has been offered to the world, abundantly and without reservation, but at the same time, God's enemy, Satan, which means "adversary," has been busy at work sowing bad seed which grows into useless plants that threaten to choke out the tender and vulnerable growth in Christ.

Jesus is telling us that wheat and weeds grow together and sometimes cannot be told apart, so that in pulling up a weed plant, one might also uproot a wheat plant...so be careful! It was not the job of the servants to systematically purge the fields and not their job to point fingers of final judgement on other groups.

The harvest in the parable is the day of judgement when Christ and his angels will gather the fruit of the good seed. This is the day of reckoning when we shall be known by our fruits. There will be no mistaken identity between the wheat and the weeds, when we shall not see through a glass darkly, but clearly as scripture says. Scripture speaks about judgement more in terms of metaphorical language, rather than exactly what will happen and when. Sometimes, we find it frustrating as we wait for God's judgement and mercy, but we cabe satisfied by the assurance that evil will not have the last word and destroy what God has planted.

How can we live faithfully until that day? As followers of Christ today, we take our places beside the servants in this passage by using caution in labeling the wheat and weeds. Political dialogue is extremely polarized today in which people are labeling one another as wheat or weeds, good or evil. Differences of thought and opinion have been elevated to good or evil which becomes dangerously divisive.

Hitler was able to do this to the Jews. He labeled them as weeds. First, he dehumanized them, making them into something less than human beings and with this label, opened all sorts of doors for the evil One to work. He then demonized them, making the Jewish people the reason for all of Germany's problems. And finally, Hitler defied the Jewish people, offering the perception of more power than they really had. In following this process, in making a people, the weeds, he was able to carry out an extermination of 6 million Jews.

In listening to our conversations today, there is a great need of caution in our dialogue as we label the "other." Let's not be so quick to call a person or group a weed. Immigrants, people of color, people who are different; are being dehumanized, and labeled as animals opening the door for the evil One to work. They are being demonized as the source of all or many of our country's problems. And then these same people are being deified and given the perception of more power than they really have. It's a recipe for the weeping and gnashing of teeth.

The seeds of wheat and weeds often look alike. Let's be careful in making those judgements. The sermon concludes with the words that Jesus uses to conclude the Parable. "Let anyone with ears, listen!"
