And all heaven applauds. And know that you are in good company. My prophets and witnesses have always gotten into this kind of trouble.



OF ST. LOUIS, MO

"Unleash[ing] the magnificent potential in children, families and neighborhoods that leads to a just community for all."

enise Carter, early childhood education director, was well aware of a rather large need within the population served by Neighborhood Houses. Many of the families are low wage earners, 75% of them earn less than \$20,000 annually. Truthfully, some simply struggle to provide many of basic needs for their children.

To that end, she designed a program to meet the health and development needs of infants and toddlers. Thus, the "Baby Essentials" program was birthed. The main goal was to provide diapers and formula for all of the children enrolled at the early childhood education center for families who could not afford a consistent supply.



Denise met with interim director of development, Christine Krueger, and shared her desire and need for funding. Christine went in search of those sources. She applied wherever she felt the need of the program matched the granters requirements. Fortunately, she filled out an application for a NIN direct service grant and was awarded \$3,000 in 2019.

In 2020, it was reported back to us that 100% of babies ages six weeks to 12 months received milk they needed while attending the Center. 50% of those babies also received one canister of formula per month for home consumption. Lastly, 100% of babies/toddlers ages six weeks to three years had diapers needed for Center and home use.

According to Christine, "thanks to the Neighbors in Need grant, our babies are dry and their tummies are full, and parents, who are already stressed financially, socially, and emotionally, have two less potential health issues with which to contend!"


Because of your generosity, direct service programs like that of Neighborhood Houses are grant funded, communities are strengthened, and neighbors experience love without judgment.

Prayers for the World Around Us

Let us pray for patience and perseverance as we continue to live with Covid-19; as we remember those who have lost loved ones, employment and their businesses. We ask that all essential people be given strength and wisdom as they continue to seek solutions to bring health and healing to our world. Help us to remain vigilant and guide our actions in the days to come.

Prayer for the Healing of our Nation

Lord, we seek peace as unrest ripples through the streets of our land. Help us listen to the hurt and pain of those who have been dehumanized and brutalized because of the color of their skin and to begin to understand the reasons for protest. Just as unrest is breaking out, we pray too, that understanding can break out just as well.

In the spring of 1947, two Bedouin boys were shepherding their sheep and goats at Qumran near the dead sea. When they discovered that one of the animals was missing, the boys went looking for it. While climbing up a hillside, one of the boys say a hole in the rocky ground. Fearing that the animal might have entered that hole or cave and not wanting to venture into this dark place on his own, the young shepherd threw a stone hoping that it would scare the animal out in the open.

Instead of the expected squeal of an animal, the boy heard the sound of breaking pottery. Frightened he ran to find his fellow shepherd. Together the boys returned to the cave. As their eyes adjusted to the darkness of the cave inside they saw some earthen ware jars, stuffed inside the jars were rolls and rolls of ancient scrolls.

The boys discovery touched off a thorough search of the area. Eventually 11 caves were discovered were over 600 scrolls with thousands of fragments. About one third of these scrolls turned out to biblical writings.

In going about their daily routine, the two boys had unexpectedly come upon one of the biggest archeological treasures of modern times. They had discovered the first of the now famous Dead Sea Scrolls.

Nearly 19 centuries earlier about 50 miles north near the sea of Galilee, Jesus told a similar story of someone going about their daily routine and suddenly coming upon treasure.

A man was working in a field and when he came upon treasure that years ago some had buried there. Palestine was a land of wars, and often people would bury their valuables to preserve them from plundering soldiers of thieves. Often and unexpectedly a town or field could become a battlefield with housed being quickly looted. In a day where there were no banks or safety deposit boxes burying money and valuables was the safest way to protect it against robbers or looters.

If the owner died before he could disclose the hiding place to heirs, the treasure lay hidden and forgotten until some lucky person discovered it.

So, Jesus is using this word picture, this parable to teach us something about God, God's kingdom, and reign. The Kingdom of God is like this treasure in a hidden field. When a man found it he went and hid it again, and then in all his joy, went and sold all that he had and bought the field. What does this mean? What does this parable tell us about God's kingdom? And what does it say about the when and where of the Kingdom?

One thing this parable makes clear, is that the Kingdom is not something in the wild blue yonder, not in glory land way beyond the blue. Nor is the Kingdom something that is totally hidden away in the future, something yet to come. It's not like some of those premilliennialist who interpret the Book of Revelation as speaking about a thousand year rule of peace and justice to be set up by Christ after his second coming. Some of these fundamentalist like Tim Lahey and others like to and will predict the exact day of the Second Coming, predict the time when the world will be destroyed, and make a few million dollars in

the process. I like the words of the 'Gloria Patria' much better... 'world without end, amen, amen'. If some of those fundamentalist would pick the hymn for this topic, they may have chosen Skeeter Davis's, "don't they know it is the end of the world?" or the 5th Dimension's...."Up, up, and Away in my beautiful balloon."

Rather, Jesus says the Kingdom of God has already broken into our present world and it is hidden in the most ordinary of places and events. It is as close to us as the treasure was a close to this man in the parable. He might have been plowing along in his field when his plow struck an obstacle with his first reaction might have been, "Oh these confounded stones again!"

What does all this tell us about the Kingdom of God? First, the Kingdom comes as a surprise, as a gift, as an act of grace. The man in the parable is not looking for treasure, he comes upon it unexpectedly.

It's the stuff that drops in your lap, totally out of the blue. I remember once being invited over to a person's house for afternoon tea. It was a routine pastoral call with a person who rarely came to worship, but he invited me to stop by and I did and enjoyed tea and cookies. Toward the end of the conversation, he said I have a gift that I would like to give the church and so he went and got his checkbook and wrote a check that was a very large and generous sum of money that was to go the Church Education Fund that helped give financial support students continuing their education.

Secondly, we discover that the Kingdom comes in the course of our daily activities. It is not located in the realm beyond death, nor is it something that will break into our lives in the future, nor does it appear in areas that designated and roped off as religious. It can appear to us anytime and anywhere. I like the story of the psychiatrist who attended a Billy Graham Crusade to study the dynamics of conversation, simply as an intellectual exercise in observation and came home converted!

Thirdly, the Kingdom, this Kingdom, demands something, it demands total commitment. It requires that we obtain it for what we treasure the most. In the parable the man sells all that he has so that he can go and purchase the field with this treasure. Think of how Olympic athletes give some much of their lives in practice to their event whether it's swimming, running, skating, skiing, whatever they event, their dedication to practice and sacrifice to achieve a metal is all becomes all consuming. Kingdom living has demands and involves our total commitment.

And finally and fourthly, the Kingdom of God comes despite and through the immoral people such as the man in the parable. If the treasure is ownerless does the finder become the legal and moral owner. Why is this person in the parable considered to be immoral? Why does this person go and purchase this field in such haste? According the Jewish law the finder of treasure would have to divide the treasurer with the owner of the field. So this quick short sale is not really moral or legal. In spite of that and through that, God's Kingdom comes. That's the way God's works, through sinful people. Think of the prostitute Rehab who

protected the Israelite spies with a lie, Moses the leader of Israel who murdered an Egyptian, and David and adultery.

God brings his Kingdom near even through what his servant people do wrong as they do right.

Perhaps you can look at your life and see where God was working in spite of who you were or what you were doing. God can take what is sinful and use that for His Kingdom purposes too! So there is hope for us.

Lord God, sometimes our routines are boring, monotonous, and tedium. Help us to see the ordinary of our routine and place as a possible source of hidden treasure, of you and your Kingdom breaking into our lives where the holy can be found in the mundane, and the sacred in the secular. In Jesus' name we pray, Amen.
