SERMON – The Parable of the Friend at Midnight: "How Much More..."
SCRIPTURE

New Testament — Luke 11:5-13

Can you imagine asking your spouse to run to Meijer's and pick up some milk and bread, only to have him/her bring home some motor oil and lighter fluid? Or imagine that it is your birthday and one of your best friends comes over and brings you a beautifully wrapped present only to open it and find that it is full of garbage. It's unthinkable isn't it? I can't imagine that!

Jesus give us a Word Picture of God and his Kingdom with this parable that poses an unthinkable situation that is hard for us to believe. One late night a hungry friend turns up unexpectedly at a friend's house and catches him without a scrap of food in the house. So, the only thing the householder could do was to go next door and wake up his neighbor and ask him for three loaves of bread, the usual meal for one person, kind of like the Mac & Cheese meal that one might have on hand for when the grandchildren come over unexpectedly for lunch or dinner. Now remember this is late at night...and if we peek into the window of the sleeping neighbor, his children are bedded down in a row on raised mats, with a parent at each end. And suddenly there comes a hammering at the door.

The head of the household is startled from his sleep and is not amused. The person inside says, "don't bother me, the door is already locked and my children are in bed...I can't get up and give you anything...but the person outside in the dark refused to take NO for an answer. He keeps knocking...the householder probably yells...Hey, don't be a nuisance...my doors were locked a long time ago. If I get up, I will disturb my whole family...No, I am staying in bed!!! But the person outside refuses to take no for an answer...he keeps knocking until at least the householder in sheer exasperation gets up, unbolts the door and gives him three loaves of bread, which is a meal in middle eastern culture.

Now think for a moment about how your neighbors might respond if you were to knock at their door at midnight and ask them for a snack for a friend that just arrived at your house. Or better yet, how would you respond if someone is knocking at your door that late at night?

On one level then, the picture that Jesus paints with this parable focuses on the persistence of the person knocking on the door. If a friend can be coaxed to get up from a comfortable sleep and begrudgingly give help, how much more likely is it that God, our heavenly friend, will be willing to help us at any hour. Ask and it will be given, search and you will find; knock and the door will be open to you. There is something about hanging in there...and keeping on...keeping on...but, if we leave this picture here, it is only half painted. The parable focuses us on something

more about God and God's rule in the world. It tells us that when you go to your neighbor at midnight, everything is against you. The hour is too late, everybody is in bed, the door is locked, but never-the-less, with that much against you, will receive what you asked for...why...because your neighbor is a person who will not act shamelessly. He can be trusted to answer the door and provide a meal.

The God to whom we pray is similarly reliable. God is faithful to his promise, God is not arbitrary, acting this way one day and that way the next day. His behavior is consistent with his inner nature. Even though you approach God at the most awkward time, you can count on God helping you. Here the emphasis is not what we can accomplish if only we are being persistent enough in our prayers, but rather on the kind of father, God is.

So, Jesus continues...which parent, if asked for a fish, will give a snake; or if a child asks for an egg, will be given a scorpion instead? That's unthinkable, isn't it? If we ask God for a fish or an egg, we can trust God not to give us a snake or scorpion.

So then, what about bringing our petitions to God in prayer? Prayer is certainly much more than a list of "give-mes" handed to God, but at the same time, nothing is too trivial or insignificant or too weighty or far-reaching to be brought to God in prayer. In the Lord's Prayer, Jesus teaches us to pray to give us each day, our daily bread...our requests can be brought to embrace our everyday needs. But our needs extend past the physical, as Jesus continues the prayer to ask God to forgive our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. If one is not able to forgive others, it is unlikely that he or she is able to accept forgiveness from God. And so weekly, we pray not only for forgiveness for ourselves, but for the grace to forgive those who have wronged us.

A problem for many people is the reconciling of the "ask and it will be given, seek and you will find, knock and the door will be opened to you," with prayer that seemingly goes unanswered. This is a place of great disappointment and difficulty for many people. It's an important question that is often the source of difficulty in even knowing what to ask for in prayer. Does Jesus really mean what he says? Is the point that we receive something even though it might not be what we asked for...some people will try and resolve the issue by putting the blame for unanswered prayer on the person praying...that is "well, you didn't pray hard enough, or have enough faith, or prayed for the wrong thing." I don't buy all that because I know many a faithful Christian who prayed over many a heart felt issue, when the prayer seemed to go unanswered...when the prayer, day after day, month after month, year after year, seems to bounce off the ceiling and God is mute or absent.

When a person is in this situation, maybe the answer to prayer is for patience and strength to live the question. That's tough! But our text today focuses on God who is a friend and who will not give his children a scorpion when they ask for an egg or a snake when asking for a fish. God's ways are not our ways and God's understandings are not ours, yet how much more does he love us and give us good things.

There is a prayer entitled, *Prayer Unanswered*, written by an anonymous author that goes like this:

I asked for strength, that I might achieve;
God made me weak that I might obey.
I asked for health, that I might do greater things;
I was given grace that I might do better things.
I asked for riches, that I might be happy;
I was given poverty, that I might be wise.
I asked for power, that I might have the praise of people;
I was given weakness, that I might feel the need of God.
I asked for all things, that I might enjoy life;
I was given life, that I might enjoy all things.
I received nothing that I asked for and hoped for;
My prayer was answered.

So, the text concludes the account and sermon this morning, "If you then who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will the Heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him!"

<u>How much more</u>...will the heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him." (Luke 11:13).

Let us pray.

Lord God, you have taught us to come to you with our requests, promising to hear us and answering our prayers. Help us to be honest, to trust you with our needs and desires and be confident that you will do what is best for us. Whatever the outcome of our prayers, keep us strong in our faith and in our love for goodness and mercy. In Jesus' name we pray, Amen.
