SERMON – The Measuring Stick for a Healthy Church

SCRIPTURE

Old Testament—Psalm 66:8-20

New Testament — John 14:15-21

Text: "If you love me, you will keep my commandments" (John 14:15)

There is no shortage of remedies to fix the church. There are packaged outreach programs for people of all ages: Boosters, born before 1945; Boomers, born between 1946-1961; Buster, born between 1962-1981; Millennials, 1981...GenXs, etc. These programs come beautifully gift wrapped with ways to build up the church. While they may be helpful tools for a congregation to understand its ministry, I wonder if they are more about our need to fix, rather than the church's need to be fixed.

In these chapters, Jesus is talking about matters that are of greatest importance. It is kind of his last will and testament. In the last chapter, Jesus gave the disciples a new commandment to live by. "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another." (John:34,35) And in today's text, "if you love me, you will keep my commandments."

Love in the Gospel of John, is more of an in-house sort of love. In Matthew, Jesus tells us to love our enemies. But here we are urged to love our fellow believers, who sometimes might be viewed as fr-enemies. There are, and have been, movements in the church were a call is heard to get back to basics; by going into all the world and making disciples through baptism, preaching and teaching. Some will emphasize this more evangelistic commission rather than stress Jesus' prophetic commission here, to love one another and follow his commandments.

In today's text, Jesus says, "if you love me, you will keep my commandments." In these concluding words to his disciples, Jesus is reminding them if they believe in him and love him, then they ought to act like it, particularly in their behavior with other believers.

When people discover that I am a minister, particularly after a wedding ceremony and at the reception table, I will invariably hear how they no longer attend a church because of how they were wounded and hurt by what a clergy person had done; by what a congregant had said to them; or by a decision that didn't quite go their way. Often times, the response is true of the way clergy and congregations treat people. Gandhi once said that he loved Jesus, but his followers gave him concern.

My response has always gone something like this; "I am sorry about what happened to you in church, but we are all sinners being saved by Jesus, but sadly sometimes sin gets the best of us. Are you willing to give Jesus' people another try"?

Sometimes people can't see the love of Christ because of the unloving behavior of those whom Christ has clearly commanded to love one another. Could that be us? Tertullian, who was one of the first apologists for the Christian faith, said that there was a major reason why the church defeated the Roman Empire without firing a single shot or raising a single platoon. The world looked at the Church and exclaimed, see how these Christians love each other! Too many people today might say, see how they fight like cats and dogs! That is not to say that conflict is unhealthy, wherever there are people gathered, there shall conflict be as well. Communities, churches, families, marriages, all experience conflict. Conflict is a part of life! What is important, is how we handle conflict, that is what makes the difference. If we love Jesus and follow his commandments, handling conflict takes on a constructive building-up attitude, instead of destructive, tearing-down attitude. Earlier in worship, in God's Direction for Our Lives, we read from I Corinthians 13, which helps add understanding to Jesus' command here in our text.

God has not seen fit to give the church a great deal of power or standing, that it once enjoyed in previous centuries and years. We are no longer the only act in town or the most influential organization, but we are given the one gift that the world finds most elusive. We are given the one thing to demonstrate to the world why Jesus makes possible a family that the world cannot produce by the world's means.

There are many measuring sticks we use to measure experience: Was it fun? Do I like it? Did I dislike it? Churches have measuring sticks too. The size and demographics of a congregation, budget and bodies, beauty of a building, cleanliness of the women's rest room, convenience of the parking lot, the number of activities and whatever other measuring sticks you can think of...

Jesus gives us yet another and better measuring stick, the most important one, "if you love me, you will keep my commandments"! That's a tall commandment for us, but a healthy measuring stick for the church. Do we love Jesus? Are we keeping his commandments? How does St. Andrew's measure up, using those metrics? That's a good question for a virtual coffee hour.

Let us pray.

Lord God, you know how difficult it is for us to love one another; so, you sent your Holy Spirit to prod and push us; to inspire and empower us; to move forward in love, particularly to love one another in the congregation. Help us to listen more deeply and to share one another's burdens and thereby witness to the world that your Advocate makes possible a loving, caring and courageous community of love; even among people like us.
