POSTLUDE

SERMON – Waste and Grace SCRIPTURE — New Testament – Matthew 13:1-9, 18-23

A sower goes out to sow seed and the seed is slung in all different directions. As we looked at this parable last week, we learned that the seed not only goes in different directions, but it lands on different surfaces. Some of it lands on the hard-packed beaten earth path and is immediately consumed by birds; other seeds land on shallow soil that covers shelf rock so that the seed cannot strike a deep root; more seed lands on the ground and begins to grow, but is choked out and kept from bearing fruit. Finally, some of the seeds fall on good soil and brings forth an abundant crop. Again, last week, an aspect and interpretation of the passage led to the question of how each of us is responding to God; and how we are receiving God's word to us in Jesus Christ. What kind of ground does one see themselves in responding to God...the hard packed beaten path, the shallow soil where the seed cannot grow a root system; good soil and early growth, but choked out by thorns, or good soil where abundant growth is taking place.

The Parable of the Sower also suggests that waste is taking place. There is a great deal of wasted seed in this parable. Only a little bit lands on good ground, takes root and contributes to an abundant harvest. Look at all the seed that is wasted!

According to the gospel of Matthew, when Jesus was born, cruel King Herod massacred hundreds of innocent Jewish baby boys. Wouldn't it have been better if not so much was made of Jesus being a King, so Herod wouldn't have felt so threatened? Perhaps the news of Jesus' birth could have been toned down a bit, but toning it down isn't what the Gospel is about. And so, the Magi show up, bringing the costliest gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. And lay these most expensive gifts at the feet of the holy family.

The exuberant extravagance continues. Jesus continually speaks to great crowds, "multitudes" as in today's passage, but how many come forward to follow...only 12?

Think of how some of the other parables spoke of waste. There was the shepherd who risked the welfare of 99 sheep in order to search for the one lost sheep until he found it; or the parable of the man who extends an invitation to come to a banquet, but all of those invited refuse to attend; or the Samaritan who gave all that he had to bandage the wounds of a man lying in a ditch that he didn't even know. There is something in these parables about extravagance and waste.

What could be more wasteful than for Jesus to lay down his life for people like us?

Let me confess to not like seeing anything go to waste. I save the paper clips from letters that I receive; still will bend down to pick up a penny; turn the lights out when leaving a room; turn

the heat down or AC up and when our adult children were growing up, I felt like the house policeman; following them around turning off lights and readjusting thermostats. Now, it's the grandchildren!

We like efficiency, where nothing goes to waste. Remember "Cheaper by the Dozen," that lively account of the life of a large family that was presided over by one of America's professional efficiency experts. This man taught the children how to live efficiently...taught them a number of foreign languages by posting words on the walls of the family bathroom because he computed that the average person spend "x" amount of hours in the bathroom; so why waste those hours.

So, the poor farmer in today's parable has a great deal working against him, from lousy soil to rocks and weeds. How can the farmer expect to grow anything? And there is a great deal against the Gospel today. We live in a violent, anxious and greedy world; while the Gospel invites us to join Jesus in living in peace, self-giving and grace. That's really what the church is against. It's a counter cultural message, all the work that goes into proclaiming that message can seem to fall on deaf ears, bringing only discouragement and disappointment.

But, that is not the whole story of Jesus' parable of the seed and the soil, which speaks not only of waste and unproductive seed; but also, of a gracious harvest. Jesus did hint that most of the seed went to waste, but some of the seed, wonder of wonders, took root, grew and brought 30, 50 and 100 times over, a rich reward.

"Let anyone with ears, listen..."

This parable ends in joy and in celebration of a great harvest. There is waste, much futile effort, ruined seed, disappointing results, but ends in astounding success. The wastefulness ought not to surprise us, there is a lot of bad soil out there. We speak truth in a world of lies; call people to walk the narrow path-way, when it is easier to walk on the wide path. In the Sermon on the Mountain, Jesus calls people to higher living, while they are content with lower expectations.

So, you ask, why witness to your faith if it is only going to fall on deaf ears? Or why do what's right, when 9 out of 10 people are quite content to "go along, to get along." Maybe you have seen in your family how different members respond to the Gospel...you have done everything you could, for some family members that falls on deaf ears, but for other members, it lands and grows. Or you have worked long and hard here at St. Andrew's and wonder if that effort was a waste of your time...there is waste and defeat, failure in faith, there's no doubt about that. But Jesus doesn't leave us there. He promised or even threatened a harvest; our work, our witness is not in vain. The promise of a harvest is just enough to keep us uneasy with our accommodation of defeat. There is waste, but in the end, a few seeds take root and grow into a rich harvest and so there is grace.

Perhaps some of you served as Sunday School teachers, or on Consistory; and there was a student whose faith grew or a Consistory project that really ministered to the church or community.

As a young man, John Harvard immigrated from England to America. All predicted the brightest future for him as a brilliant scholar. He died only after one year. When he died, he left a little over 700 pounds and a collection of a little more than 200 books to a new university in America; a university that became Harvard University. The death of John Harvard looked like a waste, but it produced an abundant harvest.

In your life, and mine, there might be a sense of waste or results that are delayed; but though delayed, the harvest will come. In God's kingdom, a great deal of waste, frustration and defeat come with the territory; yet by the grace of God, in God's own time, there shall be a harvest...gracious...surprising...and a sometimes disarming harvest.

"Let anyone with ears, listen!"

Amen.

Let us pray.

Lord God, we thank you for this parable of Jesus, these earthly stories with heavenly meanings that teach us something about you and your kingdom in our present reality. Help us hear, and listen so that we may grow to be more Christ-like each day. In Jesus' name, Amen.
