enise Carter, early childhood education director, was well aware of a rather large need within the population served by Neighborhood Houses. Many of the families are low wage earners, 75% of them earn less than \$20,000 annually. Truthfully, some simply struggle to provide many of basic needs for their children.

To that end, she designed a program to meet the health and development needs of infants and toddlers. Thus, the "Baby Essentials" program was birthed. The main goal was to provide diapers and formula for all of the children enrolled at the early childhood education center for families who could not afford a consistent supply.




Denise met with interim director of development, Christine Krueger, and shared her desire and need for funding. Christine went in search of those sources. She applied wherever she felt the need of the program matched the granters requirements. Fortunately, she filled out an application for a NIN direct service grant and was awarded \$3,000 in 2019.

In 2020, it was reported back to us that 100% of babies ages six weeks to 12 months received milk they needed while attending the Center. 50% of those babies also received one canister of formula per month for home consumption. Lastly, 100% of babies/toddlers ages six weeks to three years had diapers needed for Center and home use.

According to Christine, "thanks to the Neighbors in Need grant, our babies are dry and their tummies are full, and parents, who are already stressed financially, socially, and emotionally, have two less potential health issues with which to contend!"

Because of your generosity, direct service programs like that of Neighborhood Houses are grant funded, communities are strengthened, and neighbors experience love without judgment.

## **Prayers for the World Around Us**

Let us pray for patience and perseverance as we continue to live with Covid-19; as we remember those who have lost loved ones, employment and their businesses. We ask that all essential people be given strength and wisdom as they continue to seek solutions to bring health and healing to our world. Help us to remain vigilant and guide our actions in the days to come.

## Prayer for the Healing of our Nation

Lord, we seek peace as unrest ripples through the streets of our land. Help us listen to the hurt and pain of those who have been dehumanized and brutalized because of the color of their skin and to begin to understand the reasons for protest. Just as unrest is breaking out, we pray too, that understanding can break out just as well.

#### **SERMON- Mustard Seed Faith**

Many people today are fascinated by the "cult of bigness." We are tempted to believe that what is the largest must be the most significant- that size is value, and that big numbers mean success. There is an itch in every city to have the tallest building; often a claim to fame is to have the most of this, the largest collection of that.... we shop at large Box Stores and strive to live in "McMansions." Biggest seems to best, so it is difficult for us to hear this parable where Jesus suggests otherwise. He tells a story about a mustard seed.

"The kingdom of heaven is like a grain of mustard seed that someone took and sowed in his field; it is the smallest of all seeds, but when it is grown it is the greatest of shrubs and becomes a tree, that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches."

Among the Israelites the lowly mustard seed was a symbol of smallness.

"Tiny as a mustard seed" was an expression for something so small that it was almost invisible. The plant the seed produced when it was fully grown was quite large. A bird could devour mustard seeds by the hundreds but there was room in a mustard seed bush for hundreds of birds.

In some ways this story is exaggerated. Technically, the mustard seed is not the smallest of seeds, nor is the full grown mustard shrub a bona fide tree. However, the image in this parable is clear: small insignificant beginnings can offer a result that exceeds all expectations. God's kingdom, Jesus teaches, grows like that! Little becomes much when God is in it!

There were times when Jesus' closest followers had questions about the success of His mission. John the Baptist, who had proclaimed Jesus as the mighty one by the waters of the Jordan, raised the question from his prison cell, "Are you the one who is to come or do we look for another?" Jesus had said, at the outset of his ministry, that "the kingdom as arrived.' They believed him, and left everything to follow, but where was the kingdom? Maybe they were mistaken about Jesus, so in these moments of disappointment and fading hopes, Jesus reminds them about mustard seed.

There was no doubt about the small beginnings part. God's visit to planet earth was hardly a grand entrance. Who noticed the night Jesus was born except a few shepherds. To everybody, the big thing that was happening was the Roman census in Bethlehem. People of means did not have the slightest interest in a peasant girl giving birth to her first born. When

the man Jesus left Nazareth 30 years later he was still unknown. A carpenter from a small Galilean village with no schooling or political clout, no money, never owned land, wrote a book , and could claim no one important among his friends. He was spiked to a cross between two criminals. Where was his kingdom? Did this movement have a future? If it did, it was about to be buried, that was pretty clear. What could come of it?

The world in another way has begun to recognized the amazing complexity and power hidden in small things. Listen to these words from famous preacher in the 1920...: "Science has recently shown us the infinitude of the little. A drop of water is Venice with tides of traffic flowing through the streets. A drop of blood is a battleground with marshalled hosts of red and white corpuscles. An atom is not the smallest particle, but a universe with worlds weaving amazing patterns in its fields of space." If he were writing today, what would he say about the power of that can be released from one of those tiny atoms?

Today there is nanotechnology that delves even deeper into small particles and spaces in the universe measuring units in billionths. One billionth of a meter, from a human hair, dust mite, to a red blood cell, down to a single atom... and in nanotechnology atomic microscopes are used to see and move individual atoms.` The surface of the power of this technology is just being scratched.

So who would have dreamed that, when Jesus was crucified on the cross, dead and buried, that a world changing movement would grow out of what happened there? Who would have thought that, 21 centuries later, hundreds of millions in the world would worship Jesus, trust his promises, obey his commands, and be ready to suffer and sacrifice for his sake? Who would have imagined He would have outlasted the Caesars and be in every country in the world? And so that unknown writer hit the mark when he or she said, that this one solitary life affected the world more than all the armies that ever marched and all the parliaments that ever sat.

That goes even deeper when one thinks all the ministries to human need – education, social reform, struggles for justice, hospitals and healing, art, and beauty, comfort extended to the broken hearted, the despairing who find hope- all through Jesus. Jesus was the mustard seed who became a tower of strength and a place of shelter for all of us little birds.

What does this parable say to us this morning? It gives encouragement about the ministry here. The growth of the seed is not complete. For those who give of themselves and work and pray for Christ cause not of that is in vain.

In a world of big, where much of life seems to have lost the idea of small – businesses, institutions, and leans toward the mega stores and churches, Mustard seed faith in the living mustard seed of Jesus tells us to trust Jesus, and stand tall where little people and institutions are not insignificant and that little can become much when God is in it.

Let us pray.

Lord God, where our doubts are strong and faith is weak, give us this day mustard seed faith that will bring encouragement to know that your kingdom cannot fail, that you continue to rule over heaven and earth, and that the keys to death and hell to Jesus are given.

Amen.
