The Lord will keep your going out and our coming in from this time forth and forever more.






Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.

enise Carter, early childhood education director, was well aware of a rather large need within the population served by Neighborhood Houses. Many of the families are low wage earners, 75% of them earn less than \$20,000 annually. Truthfully, some simply struggle to provide many of basic needs for their children.

To that end, she designed a program to meet the health and development needs of infants and toddlers. Thus, the "Baby Essentials" program was birthed. The main goal was to provide diapers and formula for all of the children enrolled at the early childhood education center for families who could not afford a consistent supply.



Denise met with interim director of development, Christine Krueger, and shared her desire and need for funding. Christine went in search of those sources. She applied wherever she felt the need of the program matched the granters requirements. Fortunately, she filled out an application for a NIN direct service grant and was awarded \$3,000 in 2019.

In 2020, it was reported back to us that 100% of babies ages six weeks to 12 months received milk they needed while attending the Center. 50% of those babies also received one canister of formula per month for home consumption. Lastly, 100% of babies/toddlers ages six weeks to three years had diapers needed for Center and home use.

According to Christine, "thanks to the Neighbors in Need grant, our babies are dry and their tummies are full, and parents, who are already stressed financially, socially, and emotionally, have two less potential health issues with which to contend!"

Because of your generosity, direct service programs like that of Neighborhood Houses are grant funded, communities are strengthened, and neighbors experience love without judgment.

Prayers for the World Around Us

Let us pray for patience and perseverance as we continue to live with Covid-19; as we remember those who have lost loved ones, employment and their businesses. We ask that all essential people be given strength and wisdom as they continue to seek solutions to bring health and healing to our world. Help us to remain vigilant and guide our actions in the days to come.

Prayer for the Healing of our Nation

Lord, we seek peace as unrest ripples through the streets of our land. Help us listen to the hurt and pain of those who have been dehumanized and brutalized because of the color of their skin and to begin to understand the reasons for protest. Just as unrest is breaking out, we pray too, that understanding can break out just as well.

It is difficult to imagine any kind of special occasion without food involved. Birthdays, graduations, weddings, anniversaries, are celebrated over great food. The life of this congregation orbits around the dinners that were provided for the community.

In the Bible we find many references and images about food. In the Old Testament passage we are offered a picture of a great banquet to which all peoples have been invited. Jews and Gentiles alike are invited. The days of mourning are over. Sorrow is no more, death the last enemy has been destroyed, so now God invites everybody to a victory celebration. This banquet gives us a picture of heaven...people of all races and cultures being served the best meats and finest wines.

Against that background Jesus tells this parable of a banquet. The host prepares a great dinner, sends out the invitations, but nobody wants to come. Those invited first begin to make excuses, one person bought a house but has to do repairs first; another has bought a new car, but hasn't had a chance to drive it; still another; someone else has just gotten married and his wife wants him to shampoo the carpet. These are all ridiculous reasons for refusing the invitation.

Insulted by the declines, the host is furious. Many of you at St. Andrews can understand this response. You have worked hard all week preparing for your monthly dinners – Stuffed Cabbage, Swiss Steak, Corned Beef, Turkey, Lasagna and Sauerkraut and Knoeffle. The tables are set and decorated, the potatoes are mashed and carrots cut, the salad and dessert prepared, and the main course cooked to perfection. The doors to the fellowship hall are open, but wait....no one, absolutely no one is at the door. Nobody is coming to the dinner. You are upset, as you have invested a lot of time and elbow grease, seemingly for nothing.

So you can understand the reason the dinner host is upset. But still he responds not with vengeance but with grace. He now thinks of inviting people that no one else would think of inviting, the poor, the crippled, the lame, those whom you expect might have been excluded will be there. Far from being an exclusive affair to which only societies finest are invited, the Kingdom of God is for the disposed and the underserving.

That response would be like you saying okay, Chuck, nobody is coming why don't you go out on Ann Arbor Street and wave down any one who wants a meal. And so in the parable the servant fulfills his mission and goes out and waves down the marginal people, there is still room in the fellowship hall, so the host orders the servant to go out to the roads and country lanes and bring in all those from outside the hosts community.

First the host invites Israel's religious leaders, those who have the seating arrangement at the messianic banquet all figured out. They refuse to come. Then the host invites the Jewish masses many of whom, come, and some who are still coming. Finally, with much room still available he invites the Gentiles, many of whom come to the banquet, and many who are still coming. The parable is open ended. The host order has been issued but remains unfilled as the parable closes.

The focus of the parable shifts away from the people first invited and their reasons for declining to the banquet host who remains the master of the situation. The people first invited are a stranger to grace and seek to boycott the banquet by declining the invitation. If they would have succeeded the host would have lost control of the situation. But he remains Lord of the situation and fills the banquet hall. The declines he receives sadden him but does not stop him. He accomplishes what he sets out to accomplish.

We are to see ourselves as those who have fallen short, missed the mark, done those things we ought not to have done, and left undone those things we should have done. Those least likely to see themselves at the heavenly banquet with Jesus has the host. A poem, 'Best Poem in the World, by an anonymous author sums up a picture of those gathered for the anticipated Heavenly Banquet....it just might surprise you whose there. It goes like this:

I was shocked, confused, and bewildered as I entered Heaven's door, Not by the beauty of it all, nor the lights or its décor.

But it was the folks in Heaven who made me gasp — The thieves, the liars, the sinners, the alcoholics and the trash.

There stood the kid from seventh grade who swiped my lunch money twice. Next him was my old neighbor who never said anything nice.

Bob, who I always thought was rotting away in hell, was sitting on cloud nine looking incredibly well.

I nudged Jesus, 'what's the deal?' I would love to hear your take. How'd all these sinners get up here, God must have made a mistake.

'And why is everyone so quiet, so somber – give me a clue.' 'Hush, child,' he said, "they're all in shock.

No one thought they'd be seeing you.'

God in Jesus Christ, the host, continues to invite the peoples of the world to a banquet. As we gather around the Lord's Table on this World Wide Communion Sunday, we get a foretaste of that heavenly banquet where different peoples from different cultures have stepped forward and accepted the invitation to the banquet not because we ought but because we may; not because we are righteous but because we are penitent; not because we are strong but because we are weak; not because we are whole but because we are broken.
